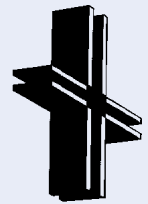

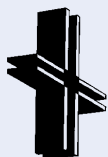

WELCOME

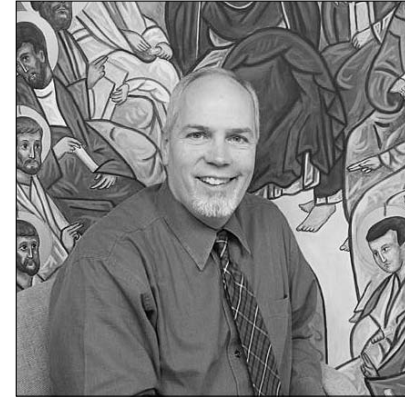

Study Day Presentations

WEDNESDAY, OCTOBER 7

A full day of study on the topic: *Liturgical Formation with Zeal and Patience*

The study day will include roundtable discussion and Q & A with the presenters, facilitated by Mrs. Rita A. Thiron.

ADDRESS 1:

"Bearing Witness to Unchanged Faith and Unbroken Tradition"

When the Church gathers for worship, we bear witness to unchanged faith, to unbroken tradition, and to unchanged love for the great mystery of the Eucharist. At Trent and at Vatican II, the councils called for a restoration of the rites "to the original norms of the holy Fathers" (GIRM 6). In the last century, the discovery and study of Sacred Scripture and ancient liturgical documents have aided our appreciation of these "original norms."

This scholarship has been coupled with a genuine pastoral concern for the people of God and their "full, conscious, and active participation in liturgical celebrations" (SC 14). We have made great strides in the formation of the people and the clergy, the implementation of the liturgical reforms, and the celebration of liturgies which give God due praise and sanctify his people.

Throughout the Church's history, there have been key moments of change. How has the Church grown? How has she born witness to unchanged faith and unbroken tradition? How does all this provide a firm foundation for the future of the liturgical renewal?



Archbishop Daniel E. Pilarczyk was ordained a priest in 1959. As Archbishop of Cincinnati since Dec. 20, 1982, the Most Rev. Daniel E.

Pilarczyk is the longest-tenured archbishop in the United States. He is also its longest-serving active bishop. He has held quite an array of national positions, including board-chair of the Catholic University of America, chair of ICEL (International Committee on English in the Liturgy), chair of the Bishops' Committees on Doctrine, Liturgy and Priorities and Plans – and vice-president and president of the U.S. episcopal conference.

ADDRESS 2:

"We Praise You with Greater Joy than Ever"

"Zeal for the promotion and restoration of the liturgy is rightly held to be a sign of the providential dispositions of God in our time, a movement of the Holy Spirit in the Church. Today it is a distinguishing mark of the Church's life, indeed of the whole tenor of contemporary religious thought and action" (SC 43). This statement still rings true forty-five years after it was written. But what is happening in houses of formation and parish pews? What do current studies reveal about various liturgical ministries, the implementation of current norms, responses to multi-cultural needs, and the formation of God's holy people? How can bishops and their staffs develop processes that both respect authority and serve the people?



Sr. Katarina Schuth, OSF, Ph.D. is an active member of the Sisters of Saint Francis of Rochester,

Minnesota, since 1960, through most of which she has been a faculty member in higher education institutions. Currently she holds an Endowed Professorship for the Social Scientific Study of Religion at the Saint Paul Seminary School of Divinity at the University of St. Thomas, St. Paul, MN. Educated in both the Social Sciences and Theology, she has earned an M.A. and Ph.D. in Cultural Geography from Syracuse University, and a Master of Theological Studies and License in Sacred Theology from Weston Jesuit School of Theology in Cambridge, MA, as well as a B.A. in History from the College of Saint Teresa, Winona, MN.

ADDRESS 3:

"We Do Well Always and Everywhere to Give God Thanks..."

"The Church earnestly desires that Christ's faithful, when present at this mystery of faith, should not be there as strangers or silent spectators...they should take part in the sacred service conscious of what they are doing...they should be formed day by day into an ever more perfect unity with God and with each other..." (SC 48). How do we best undertake such an important task?

Yes, we aware of the complexities of teaching our assemblies the changes in the Roman Missal and the pastoral concerns that will be raised during this process, but we stand ready to serve our bishops and to offer liturgical formation with the same "zeal and patience" that has always been required and has always been lead by the Spirit.



Daniel Cardinal DiNardo was ordained to the priesthood in 1977. Twenty years later he was appointed

coadjutor Bishop of Sioux City, Iowa and became the diocesan ordinary the following year. In March of 2004, the Most Rev. Daniel DiNardo was appointed coadjutor Bishop of Galveston-Houston, being installed as Archbishop in February of 2006. In 2007, he was elevated to the College of Cardinals, becoming the first Cardinal in the U.S. South. Currently Cardinal DiNardo is on the USCCB Ad Hoc Committee to Oversee the Use of the Catechism. He also serves as the Episcopal advisor to the National Association of Pastoral Musicians and the National Catholic Partnership for Persons with Disabilities.



Facilitator: Mrs. Rita A. Thiron was the Facilitator of the Study Mornings during the 2007 National Meeting in

Hartford. She serves the Diocese of Lansing in the Office of Worship. She is Vice-Chair of the FDLC Board of Directors, and serves as a representative from Region 6.

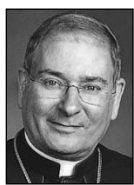

Celebrating Our Hidden Wholeness

From his hospital bed a half century ago Thomas Merton, Trappist monk and patient, came to a consoling insight: he was still connected – to his brothers back at the monastery and in a real but mysterious way with people of every time and place. As he sought to find the right expression for this unity of all life in God, he called it “hidden wholeness.”

We might even say that “hidden wholeness” is another way of describing the mystery of the “Communion of Saints”; we believe that already now we can begin to experience a healing of the brokenness of our lives as we share in Christ’s reconciling love. What might we do to insure that our liturgical celebrations truly are sacramental expressions of Christ’s prayer that “all may be one”?



Msgr. John Zenz was ordained July 1, 1978, and currently serves as Pastor of Holy Name Parish in Birmingham, Michigan.

He serves as Episcopal Vicar for the North-west Region of the Archdiocese of Detroit. Monsignor Zenz received an S.T.D. (Doctorate in Spiritual Theology) from the Pontifical Gregorian University and has served on the faculty of Sacred Heart Major Seminary continuously since 1979.

Liturgical Catechesis: The Sacraments of the Faith that Comes from Hearing

Experience in the ministry confirms for us who serve the People of God that sound catechesis is indispensable for the “full, conscious and active/actual participation” in the Sacred Liturgy to which the Fathers of the Second Vatican Council called the Church (*Sacrosanctum concilium*, n.14). The nature of liturgical catechesis is rooted both in the “ecology” of the Sacred Liturgy itself — with its constant interplay of “words and deeds” (see *Dei verbum*, n.4), and in the very nature of the persons brought into communion at the Liturgy, viz., God and human beings. The address will articulate the essential links we recognize exist between Liturgy and catechesis and then explore some the marks of excellence in liturgical catechesis.



Most Rev. Allen Vigneron is the Archbishop of Detroit. He earned his M.A. in philosophy in 1983 and his Ph.D. in May 1987 from the Catholic University of America. In 1996, he was named auxiliary

Bishop of the Archdiocese of Detroit, receiving his episcopal ordination from Cardinal Adam Maida. On January 10, 2003, he was named Coadjutor Bishop of Oakland, California, and succeeded to the See of Oakland on October 1, 2003. Bishop Vigneron oversaw the design and construction of the new Cathedral of Christ the Light. Following his appointment by Pope Benedict XVI, Bishop Vigneron returned to Detroit, and on January 5, 2009, was introduced as the next chief shepherd of the local Roman Catholic Church.

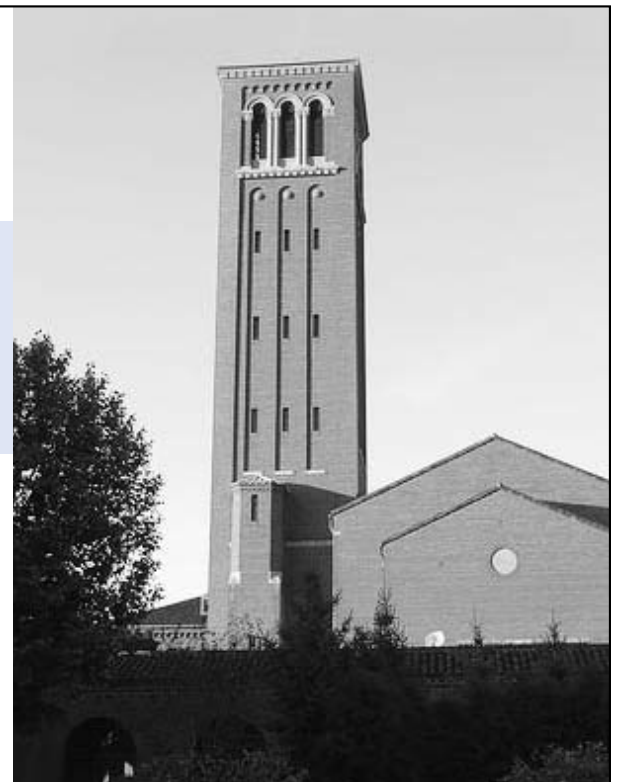
The National Meeting of Diocesan Liturgical Commissions will be held at the **Inn at St. John's and St. John's Retreat Center**. Housing is available at both locations.
